Workers' employment must be, or have been related to the production of articles (products) described in the petition.

## **Definitions**

<sup>1</sup> **Duly Authorized Representative** – A duly authorized representative includes one of the following: a company official, a One-Stop operator or partner (including a state employment security agency or and dislocated worker unit representative), or a union or other duly authorized representative.

<sup>2</sup> **Company Contact** - The contact must be a company official knowledgeable about the company's production, sales and employment data or is able to obtain such information. That information is required for an investigation into the eligibility of a worker group for TAA and will be requested from the company contact after this petition is confirmed to be valid.

<sup>3</sup> **Secondarily Affected Worker** – A worker in a firm serving as a Supplier to another firm affected by imports from, or a shift in production to, foreign countries; A worker in a firm serving as a Downstream Producer to another firm affected by imports from, or a shift in production to, Canada or Mexico.

- **Supplier** – a firm that produces and supplies directly to another firm component parts for articles that were the basis for a certification of eligibility to apply for TAA.
- **Downstream Producer** – a firm performing additional, value-added production processes (including final assembly or finishing) directly for another firm for articles that were the basis for a certification of eligibility to apply for TAA based on an increase in imports from, or a shift in production to, Canada or Mexico.

## **Information**

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**Background** - The Trade Act of 1974 (19 U.S.C. § 2317) established a Trade Adjustment Assistance Program to provide services to workers in firms adversely affected by imports from foreign countries. The Trade Act of 2002 amended TAA to extend eligibility to workers in firms affected by shifts in production to certain foreign countries; eligibility was also extended to certain secondary workers.

**How this information will be used** - The U.S. Department of Labor will use the information contained on this form to determine whether to begin an eligibility investigation on behalf of the petitioning workers. Typically, investigations take 40 days.

**Obligations** - Persons are not required to respond to this collection of information unless it displays a currently valid Office of Management and Budget (OMB) control number. Respondents' obligations to reply to these reporting requirements are required to obtain benefits. Public reporting burden for this collection is estimated to average 20 minutes per response, including the time for reviewing instructions, searching existing data sources, gathering and maintaining the data needed, and completing and reviewing the collection of information. Dear Mr. Sullivan:

I am writing in support of the attached petition for Trade Adjustment Assistance certification for the workers at the Textron Fastening Systems, Ring Screw Division, Warren, Michigan. The International Union, UAW, Region 1 and Local Union 771 are jointly filing this petition on behalf of all trade-impacted workers employed at this facility.

This petition is the result of mass layoffs at this facility and the expected closing of the plant. Dislocations began in April of 2004 and all production is scheduled to cease by September 2004. Approximately 85 workers will be displaced as a result of this plant closing (Attachment 1 - Seniority Report and Expected Separation Date as of June 23, 2004). This facility is one of many facilities operated by Textron Fastening Systems worldwide.

This facility manufactured a variety of steel fastening devices for the automotive and automotive parts industries. They produced approximately 800 separate parts for these industries (Attachment 2 - Multi-Page List of Parts with Customer Facility).

The primary customers of this facility included Ford Motor Company (including facilities located in the United States (U.S.), Canada and Mexico), General Motors Corporation (including facilities in the U.S., Canada and Mexico), and

DaimlerChrysler Corporation. In addition, they supplied fasteners to other Textron facilities.

Many of the facilities supplied by this Textron plant are located in Canada and Mexico. We believe these overseas facilities have shifted to local suppliers (Canadian and Mexican). In addition, we believe that much of the fastener work that was once done for U.S. customers are now being imported from foreign suppliers.

The U.S. International Trade Commission (USITC) tracks the importation of products into the United States. They utilize Harmonized Tariff Trade Schedule numbers (HTS) to categorize and track imports. The HTS numbers for products that are like or competitive with some of the products manufactured at the Warren, Michigan facilities are: HTS 73181100 - "Iron or steel, coach screws" (Attachment 3), HTS 73181410 - "Iron or steel, self-tapping screws, w/shanks or threads less than 6 mm. In diameter" (Attachment 4), HTS 7318450 - "Iron or steel, self-tapping screws, w/shanks or threads 6 mm or more in diameter" (Attachment 5), HTS 7318520 - "Iron or steel, bolts and bolts & the nuts or washers, imported in the same shipment" (Attachment 6), HTS 73181540 - "Iron or steel, machine screws (o/than cap screws), 9.5 mm or more in length and 3.2 mm in diameter" (Attachment 7), and HTS 73181580 - "Iron or steel, screws and bolts, nesoi, having shanks or threads 6 mm or more in diameter" (Attachment 8).

The USITC database for HTS Number 73181100 (Attachment 3, page 3) demonstrates that imports of parts like or competitive with these parts manufactured at the Warren, Michigan facilities have experienced a substantial increase (+11.1%) in the period January-April 2004 versus the comparable 2003 period (the most recent available). This is in addition to a 14.5% increase in the value of imports in this product category in the 2001-2003 period.

The USITC database for HTS Number 73181410 (Attachment 4, page 3) has a small decline (4.3%) in the January-April 2004 period versus the comparable 2003 period. How, this hardly offsets the huge surge (+35%) in the value of imports in this product category in the 2001-2003 periods.

The USITC database for HTS Number 73181450 (Attachment 5, page 3) follows the same type of pattern as HTS 73181100 and 73181410 which is an increase (+2.8%) in the most recent January-April period versus the comparable 2003 period following a more substantial increase (+10%) over the last three years.

The USITC database for HTS Number 73181520 (Attachment 6, page 3) also continues with this same pattern in the most recent quarter (+14.7%) following a 12% increase over the prior three years. These increases are larger in percentage terms, as well as, on much larger gross dollar volumes.

The USITC database for HTS Numbers 73181540 (Attachment 7, page 3) and 73181580 (Attachment 8, page 3) follow the same patterns as above. All of these product categories have experienced substantial and sustained increases in the value of imports over the last three years. The modest declines for the most recent quarter for two of the product categories hardly offset the increases those same product categories experienced since 2001.

These facts clearly support an affirmative certification and we ask that the Warren, Michigan facility be certified as trade impacted.

Given that this is a plant closing caused by the importation of articles like or directly competitive with those manufactured at the Warren, Michigan facility causing the dislocation of 85+ workers, we believe that this situation clearly demonstrates all the requirements set forth in Section 222 (a), Title I of the Trade Act of 1974 as amended (19 USC 2272).

I would ask your speedy consideration in this matter.
